OBJECTIVES:

For the summer internship portion of the program, the scholar will spend half of the summer with the summer internship program of Shearman & Sterling, and the other half with the summer internship program of the Legal Defense Fund. The goal of the internships is to introduce the scholars to both private and public interest law practices in order to help them choose the future direction of their legal careers. The mentoring portion of the program provides the scholar with one attorney-mentor from each of these organizations, who will be available throughout the scholar's law school career to provide support, counseling, and general advice, and to facilitate the scholar's exposure to each organization.

ELIGIBILITY

Applications may be submitted by students in their final year of undergraduate study who are applying to law school, and by individuals planning a career change by attending law school.

FUNDING

Each annual grant includes a \$13,500 scholarship, and a \$1,500 allowance to meet the costs of attending the Legal Defense Fund's annual Civil Rights Institute. (bjv)
