

Historical Archaeology in Downtown San Antonio, Texas:

An Evaluation of Properties at the Proposed
VIA Downtown Park and Ride Facility

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ABSTRACT

VIA Metropolitan Transit is proposing to build a Park and Ride Facility near downtown San Antonio immediately east of Interstate Highway 37 in an area bounded by Crockett, Center, and Walnut streets, and IH 37. Starting in the 1850s this area has been traditionally inhabited primarily by African-Americans. A review of previous archaeological investigations in the downtown area of San Antonio revealed a gap in knowledge concerning African-Americans in San Antonio.

Individual lot evaluations indicate intact archaeological materials may survive in certain areas. If these areas are to be impacted then additional archaeological evaluations would be needed to accurately assess the integrity of the archaeological remains.

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INTRODUCTION

This document is an archaeological evaluation of the planned VIA Downtown Park and Ride Facility in east central San Antonio by the Center for Archaeological Research (CAR) of The University of Texas at San Antonio. The project area is located in a traditional African-American neighborhood that has a long history of occupation in that location. The objectives for additional archaeological investigations are to further document the archaeology and history of the African-American inhabitants of San Antonio and to gain a better understanding of the socioeconomic conditions of the African-American community in the context of historic San Antonio.

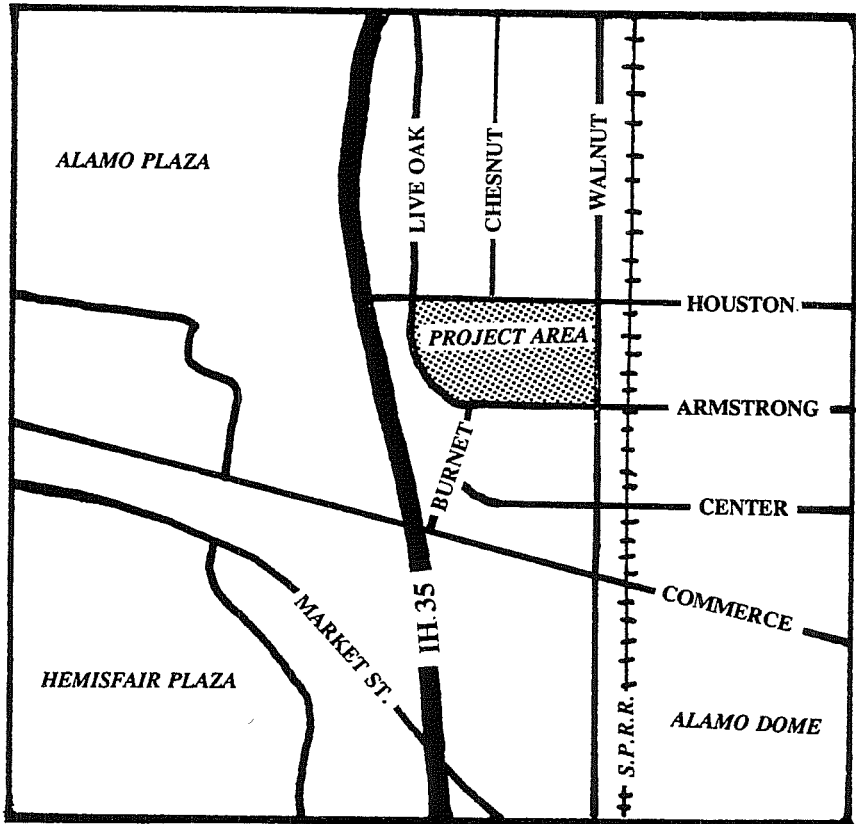
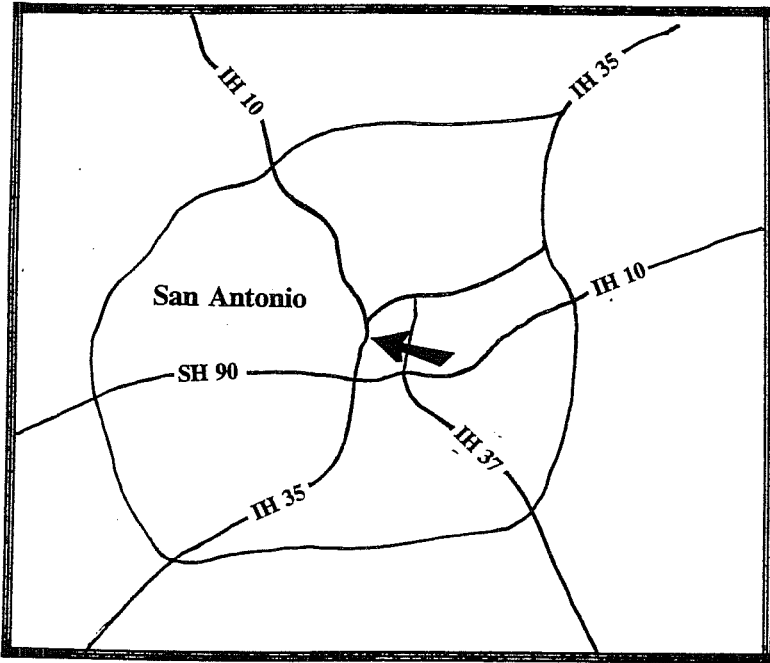


Figure 1. Project location.

The African-American community in San Antonio is not well studied, nevertheless these individuals played a significant role in the development of the city. The project area was an important African-American neighborhood that blossomed shortly after the Civil War (Figure 1). Beaty Saunders Architects (1994) record a complex history for the area, their report is briefly summarized below. For historical purposes the project area is divided into three areas: New City Block (NCB) 168 in the west, NCB 579 in the middle, and NCB 580 in the east. These areas experienced slightly different development histories that could impact any additional archaeological investigations.

In the early portion of the nineteenth century the project area was farmland, but development began in NCB 168 in the 1850s. By 1873 several dwellings had been built in the western portion of NCB 168 on North Central Street (now East Crockett Street), Pecan Street (now Live Oak Street), and South Central Street (now Center

Street). Most of the sites on Live Oak and Center streets were destroyed by the construction of Interstate Highway 37 (IH 37) in the late 1960s. In general terms the southern and western portions of NCB 168 were developed by Anglo-Americans, and the northern and southeast portions were developed by African-Americans. NCB 579 was initially owned by Sam Maverick who sold lots between 1879 and 1886. This residential block was developed by African-Americans. The northern portion of NCB 580 was developed by prominent African-Americans, and railroad shanties were built in the eastern portion. In 1873 a few structures, including an African-American church, were present in NCB 580. After the turn of the century the southern portion of NCB was developed as commercial properties, the first such developments in the project area.

Today a few of the lots still have dwellings, many have been cleared of structures, several are parking lots, and the remainder are commercial properties. Only a few original dwellings still exist and these do not date to the earliest period of development.

This report is divided into four parts. The first section discusses previous archaeological investigations in downtown San Antonio that are relevant to this current project. The second section presents a very brief review of pertinent U.S. census data. The third section provides a review of historical archaeological investigations in the Americas that have dealt with some of the archaeological problems and issues likely to be encountered on this project. The fourth section summarizes a lot-by-lot archaeological evaluation of the individual properties.

PREVIOUS HISTORICAL ARCHAEOLOGICAL RESEARCH IN DOWNTOWN SAN ANTONIO

In the last two decades numerous historical archaeological excavations have been conducted at sites in the downtown area of San Antonio. The investigations included residential sites representing nearly every ethnic group present in the San Antonio area. The most significant projects ranged in size from single-house sites to large excavations for Rivercenter Mall (ca. two city blocks) and the Alamodome (14 city blocks). Table 1 summarizes the dates of site occupation and ethnicity represented by the most important excavations. Various projects at the Alamo have been excluded since this was a Spanish mission and later a battlefield. The following section summarizes the extent and the results of these various projects.

Arciniega Street

Paul R. Katz (1978) directed CAR's archaeological investigations on NCB 901 and NCB 155 in the La Villita Historic District in preparation for the construction of a multi-story luxury hotel. Investigations included excavation of 17 backhoe trenches. Twelve mid- to late-nineteenth century residential and commercial structures were investigated as were assorted pits and a lateral section of the Concepción acequia. An unlined latrine pit containing household artifacts dating to the 1880–1890 period was excavated. In addition, a cistern (100 x 140 cm) was excavated, as was an adjacent stone-lined feature (70 x 140 cm). The latter may have been either a settling tank or a cooling chamber for perishable food. Artifacts recovered from the fill of the cistern complex dated from the early 1800s to the early 1900s. The area was apparently utilized for irrigated agriculture until ca. 1811–1831 or slightly later (Katz 1978:73). According to archival research the earliest structure on the site was built ca. 1840. Occupants of the area ranged from a prominent early nineteenth century Hispanic family to several middle-class German and Anglo-

American families in the late-nineteenth to early twentieth centuries.

Gresser Site

CAR's archaeological investigations at the Gresser house in the La Villita Historic District in 1977 were directed by James E. Ivey (1978) for the San Antonio Conservation Society. The purpose of the project was to examine the building foundation remains that were uncovered during renovation work at the site. Four 1-x-1-meter test units were excavated to record the two-room building foundation to the south of the standing house. Artifacts recovered confirmed the 1819 to 1841 date of the original occupation on the site. Through archival research the complete occupational history of the site was reconstructed, and the excavations recorded the construction method of the first house.

Dolores Aldrete Site

The Klose family contracted with CAR in 1978 to conduct an archaeological investigation on their property, which consisted of Lots 7, 8, and 9 of NCB 155 in the La Villita Historic District. The investigation, directed by Daniel E. Fox (Fox et al. 1978), consisted of six test pits in and around two houses on the property: a palisado house (upright wood post construction) dating from ca. 1818, and a caliche block house built ca. 1857. The purpose of the project was to research the ownership and construction history of the two structures. Recorded structural details enabled the archaeologists to reconstruct the history of the construction and remodeling of the adobe house, and artifacts recovered from both houses confirmed the archival record of occupations. The palisado house had been built and occupied by an early nineteenth-century Hispanic family, while the adobe house was built and occupied by Robert Caile, an Englishman newly arrived in San Antonio, who rapidly

became notorious as a gambler and drinking man.

Rivercenter Mall

In 1984–1985, CAR investigations under the direction of Anne A. Fox and I. Wayne Cox (Gross et al. in preparation) for construction of Rivercenter Mall involved historical and archaeological research of an area, several city blocks in extent, one block east of Alamo Plaza. The residents were nearly all European immigrants to the city in the mid-nineteenth century, primarily from Germany. The project consisted of an archival-research phase to reconstruct the ownership and structural history of the entire area. From the resulting lot histories, 18 lots were chosen for backhoe test excavations. The final phase of the project consisted of hand excavation of five privies and one well. Extensive test excavations were also carried out on a lot reputed to contain the remains of a the funeral pyre from the battle of the Alamo. No trace of this feature was present.

La Villita Earthworks

The La Villita Earthworks project was an emergency CAR excavation on NCB 155, directed by Joseph H. Labadie (1986a), which grew out of the Rivercenter Mall Project. The site was discovered in the process of preparing a location in La Villita onto which to move a hotel from the mall site. A deep trench was found, delimited, and totally excavated. The trench was determined to be an earthwork constructed by the Mexican army during the Battle of the Alamo. The trench contained a wide complement of military arms and related objects of the period at and near the bottom. Over these was found a collection of household artifacts closely dated to the period of the battle. Additional excavations on this lot (Labadie 1986b) consisted of eight backhoe trenches, one of which located a brick-lined privy pit which was related to a nineteenth century Anglo-American home that stood on this lot from ca. 1860–1927. The artifacts in the privy pit fill were late nineteenth to early twentieth century in date.

Smith Site

Archival and archaeological investigations were conducted by CAR for the city of San Antonio under the direction of Bruce Nightengale (Nightengale et al. 1989) in preparation for the relocation of the eastbound lanes of Martin Street, several blocks north of Military Plaza. The site was irrigated farmland during the eighteenth century and was not developed until the mid-nineteenth century at which time a small adobe house was built. The county clerk, Thaddeus Smith, purchased the lot in 1882 and moved into the adobe house. In 1898 Smith constructed a new dwelling immediately south of the adobe house. This was a large, two-story Victorian home. The adobe house became a commercial structure occupied by various businesses. Both structures were removed when the site became a parking lot in 1958. Archaeologists used both backhoe- and hand-excavated units to expose the foundations of the two structures and to record various changes in the adobe structure over time. Artifacts recovered related primarily to the mid-nineteenth century occupation and the later commercial operations present on the site, although some late eighteenth century ceramic sherds suggested there may have been an earlier structure on or near this site before the adobe was built.

Ruiz Site

In 1989 Herbert G. Uecker (1991) directed excavations for the city of San Antonio on a lot just south of Military Plaza, in the proposed location of an auxiliary generator next to the City Hall Annex. The property had been the site of the Ruiz family home, a prominent family for several generations in late-eighteenth- and early nineteenth-century San Antonio. The location on the lot to be excavated for installation of the generator was known to have been the site of a house occupied by Eugenio Ruiz, whose father served as mayor of the city at the time of the Battle of the Alamo and as a city alderman from 1837 to 1841. The house was constructed sometime between 1888 and 1892 and razed ca. 1928. Much of the archaeology on the site

consisted of monitoring excavation of the necessary pipelines and a pit for installing a generator. A series of test units was excavated to establish stratification in the area. A brick-lined privy pit was partially excavated, yielding artifacts typical of the late-nineteenth-century period. Artifacts from the site represented the middle- to late-eighteenth century to the late-nineteenth century and were typical of households of those periods.

Justice Center Site

From 1978 to 1987, archaeological investigations were carried out periodically by CAR for the Bexar County Commissioners' Court on NCB 100, the proposed site of a new Justice Center for the county (Fox et al. 1989). The project started in the parking lot at the south end of the block; as parcels were acquired by the county and buildings were demolished, additional work was done wherever basements had not destroyed the archaeological evidence. Investigations, done under the supervision of Anne A. Fox, involved backhoe trenching and hand excavation of selected areas. Numerous eighteenth- and nineteenth-century house sites were recorded and tested with excavation units. The route of the San Pedro acequia, which ran through the entire block, was plotted and its contents examined through hand excavation of sections of the trenches. The occupations involved early Hispanics and later Anglo-American citizens. Recording of various types of house foundations continued throughout the project and added a great deal to our knowledge of early San Antonio building techniques. This project also provided an opportunity to correct mistaken attributions of the ownership of several buildings on Main Plaza.

Mojaras Site

Anne A. Fox (Fox et al. 1988) directed backhoe testing of a portion of NCB 120 in La Villita for CAR under contract with the City Public Service in preparation for construction of a below-grade addition to their parking garage. The property had originally been the location of a small adobe

house built by José Maria Mojaras in 1847. One edge of the property had been bordered by the Concepción acequia, which was filled in the early 1870s. Three backhoe trenches revealed disturbed traces of limestone and brick foundations. Also observed were many indications that demolition of the house and later grading of the lot had eliminated all other evidences of the Mojaras occupation and a later brick commercial building. Very few artifacts were recovered, most of which dated to the Mojaras occupation in the mid-nineteenth century.

McDonald Site

I. Wayne Cox (1991) excavated portions of NCBs 2553 and 2969, several blocks south of Main Plaza, for CAR under contract with the San Antonio Housing Authority. In the process of discovering the route of the San Pedro acequia through the area, the foundations of a house built in 1855 by John Stewart McDonald, a prominent San Antonio citizen, were excavated and recorded. The preliminary work to locate and delimit the house was done with a backhoe, then hand excavation was used to trace the entire cut-limestone foundation. Artifacts found were directly related to the construction of the house, for the most part, although a limited collection of fragments of glass bottles, ceramics, and miscellaneous household objects was also recovered. In 1994 Cox directed additional excavations in NCB 2553/2969 for SAHA to test the San Pedro acequia and discovered a wood-lined portion (Nickels and Gibson, in preparation).

Alamodome Project

In preparation for the construction of the Alamodome, detailed historical and archival research was carried out by CAR under the direction of Anne A. Fox and Kenneth G. Wright in 1990–1992 (Fox and Hard 1995, and in preparation; Wright 1995). A detailed and intensive research phase was followed by hand and backhoe testing of selected sites within the 14-city-block area. Following the testing phase,

intensive mitigation was conducted on specific sites. This extensive project included excavation of 12 privies, two wells, one cistern and multiple 2-x-2-foot and 4-x-4-foot sample units, large excavation blocks, and backhoe trenches in approximately 30 house lots.

The first houses in the area were built primarily by Germans in the mid- to late-nineteenth century, followed by an influx of Hispanic residents as the German families died out or moved away. As seen from the names in Table 1, the original builders were Germans as late as the 1880s. Only the Webb house site could be irrefutably identified as being built and owned by an African-American family. William Webb, a freed slave, built the first house on the site in 1866. Charles Webb, who was apparently related to William and probably a Buffalo Soldier, built a house on the south half of the lot and his widow continued to live there after his death in the early 1870s. William's daughter and her husband constructed a house on the lot ca. 1889, and continued to live there into the twentieth century. The assemblage of recovered artifacts from the Webb site and their provenience within the site have proved interesting in comparison with other sites in the area. There was an extensive area of the backyard that appeared to have been totally covered with buried trash pits, the contents dated to the mid-nineteenth century. This trash area continued onto the lot next door, which at that time would have been undeveloped. At none of the other mid-nineteenth-century lots examined by this project, or on any other project in downtown San Antonio, did we find this sort of concentrated trash disposal, which could indicate either that the other lots had been bulldozed at some point in time or that a different method of household garbage disposal was used there. A section at the southeast corner of the Alamodome area consisted of small frame houses built on smaller lots in 1917-1920. Many of these were rented to African-American families at first; later a number of these families purchased their houses. These houses were sold and most had been moved off the site by the time the archaeologists reached that area.

Summary and Conclusions

The archaeological investigations so far carried out in downtown San Antonio have included eighteenth- and nineteenth-century Hispanic occupations, nineteenth- and early twentieth-century German occupations, a few Anglo-American houses of the late-nineteenth to early twentieth century, one African-American residential site dating from 1866 to the mid-twentieth century, and one early twentieth-century African-American commercial site.

Because of the predominance of later disturbance on most downtown lots, we have had very little opportunity to examine original surface deposits. This is particularly true of sites of the period between 1800 and the Civil War. On these sites we have been able to learn a great deal about the methods of construction of jacal and palisado houses (vertical log construction) and adobe houses (soft limestone block), particularly through the traces of these structures still preserved in the ground. The influx of German immigrants took place just before the Civil War, yet we do not know much about their lifeways and general adaptations because we have excavated few pits and wells of this period that provide artifacts reflecting life at that time.

Trash deposits from early nineteenth-century occupation at the Spanish missions have given us a full range of the artifacts which can be anticipated on such sites, however, and allowed us to identify the early occupations on downtown sites as well. Ceramics imported from Mexico and England are typical on these sites, along with datable bottle fragments and important collections of animal bone that reflect hunting as well as a basic dependence on beef, sheep/goat, and occasional pork.

The period after the Civil War until about 1900 was one of rapid change in the city, mirroring trends that occurred throughout the U.S. The arrival of the railroad in 1877 made large shipments of lumber and bricks available for house construction and allowed the possibility of

multi-story houses which required robust cut-stone foundations. Substantial two-story residences began to appear in portions of the city, often designed by architect-builders. Cut stone and brick began to be used for privy pits. Also at this time strict ordinances were passed by the city council dictating annual cleaning of privies. Since water and sewer services were still not available, wells and cisterns became the order of the day, for the acequias were no longer dependable sources for anything but irrigation water. Garbage collection was not available so people either hired cartmen to carry off their trash, burned it, or buried it in their yards. Ceramics in common use reflected the fashion of the time, consisting of plain, white ironstone ware, with yellow ware bowls and milk pans and stoneware jugs, churns, and crocks in the kitchen. Bottles had mold lines from the base up to and, later, including the rim. Much of the kitchenware, however, came from European sources, as U.S. factories were just beginning to enter the market. Analysis of bone found on many of these sites reflects the local custom of dispatching hunting parties to the hills to the north and west of town, where deer, turkey, and other wild game were numerous and easy to obtain. These supplemented the town's appetite for beef, which was butchered in local markets and sold each morning to housewives. Evidence for fishing and catching turtles in local creeks and rivers is also present on most sites. By this time the town was filling up, with rows of houses of similar appearance lining neighborhood streets as the population grew rapidly. Public trolleys allowed workers to live farther from their jobs and encouraged the development of suburban areas just outside the main plazas.

The period from 1900 to the mid-twentieth century was a time of acceptance of new ideas in San Antonio. Automobiles were introduced, the train was now an accepted form of transportation, and people looked to the mail-order house as the source from which all blessings flowed. American-made ceramics were

popular, particularly those with decalcomania designs produced in large sets of matching plates, cups, saucers, sugar bowls, creamers, serving dishes, etc. The heyday of the cheap, machine-made bottle arrived in 1903 and from that date all deposits of household garbage contained more glass bottle fragments than any other type of material. Nearly all faunal deposits now reflect the fact that commercial butchering had taken over, except for the occasional household hunter and fisherman. Fashions changed with bewildering speed, going from celluloid collars and collar buttons and tight corsets under floor-length dresses, to flapper fashions of the 1920s, to the saddle shoes and sweaters and skirts of the 1940s. Architecture changed as well, as the suburbs pushed ever outward from the downtown; the latter enlarged and took over areas that had recently been neighborhoods of small houses, grass, and trees only a block away from the plazas. Small houses now were built on piers, for the most part, and were rather easily moved from one lot to another as commercial districts moved in. Large multi-story buildings and parking lots took over the downtown area as San Antonio developed into a modern city. The water and sewer systems finally arrived, causing gradual abandonment of the acequias and filling-in of the wells and privies with trash of the 1900 to 1910 period. Artifact assemblages from the acequias are valuable for archaeological study, but they do not aid in reconstructing the lifeways of mid-to-late nineteenth century San Antonio.

In summation, a fair amount is archaeologically known about certain areas of San Antonio and certain portions of the San Antonio populations at specific periods. However some segments of the city's population are poorly known, and this is especially true for nineteenth century African-Americans. Only one African-American-occupied site (the Webb house) has been intensively investigated.

SAN ANTONIO CENSUS REPORTS

During the process of evaluating the potential of the study area, the names of all African-American and mixed-blood families were extracted from selected census reports between 1850 and 1890 for the city of San Antonio. It became apparent that the percentage of this population increased greatly during the ensuing 40 years after the 1850 census. To determine if this was a true reflection of a change in the demographic structure of the city, a comparison was sought by an analysis of the population figures between the years of 1850 to 1890.

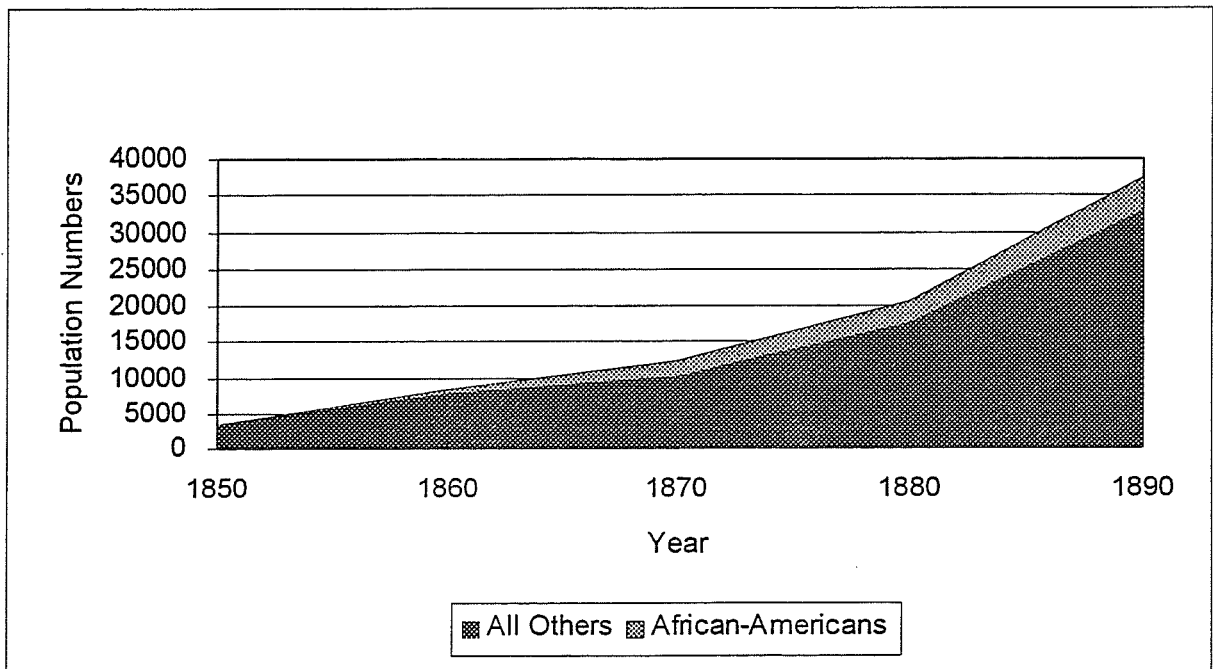


Figure 2. Population changes among African -Americans and Anglo-Americans in the city of San Antonio between 1850 and 1890. Note the exponential increase in both groups.

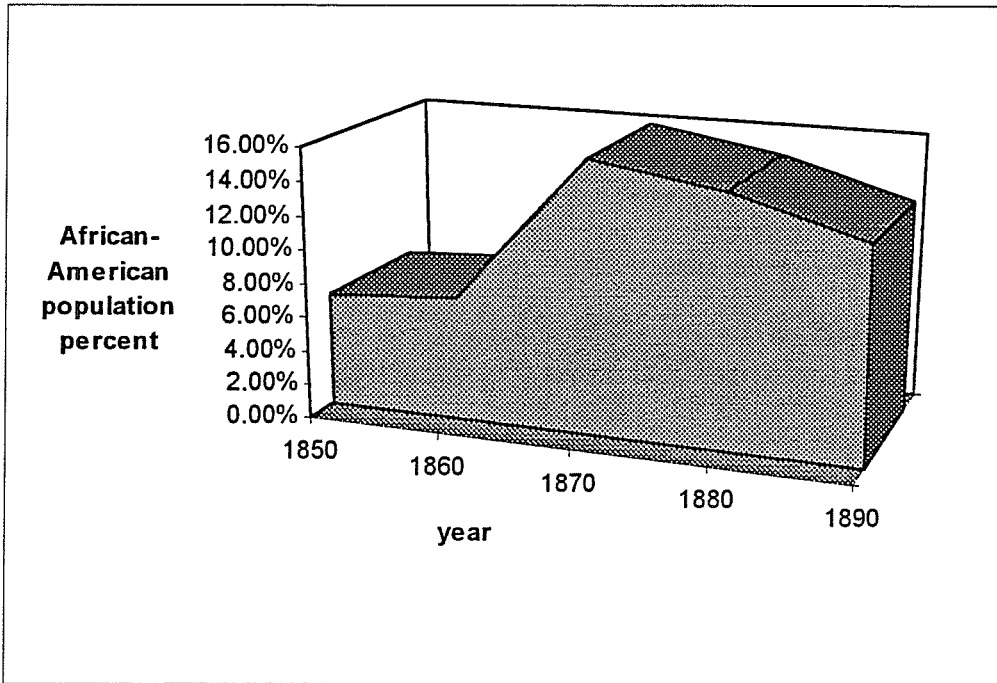


Figure 3. *Relative proportion of African-Americans in the population of San Antonio between 1850–1890. Note the dramatic increase in the percent of African-Americans immediately after the Civil War.*

As Figure 2 illustrates, the city's overall population and the African-American segment of the population increased between 1850-1890. The steady rise in population for the city was not unexpected, numerous researchers had recognized the trend in the past and generally

attributed it to the arrival of rail transportation to the city. The marked increase in relative size of the African-American population illustrated in Figure 3 appears to indicate several significant aspects to the change in the city's population and social structure.

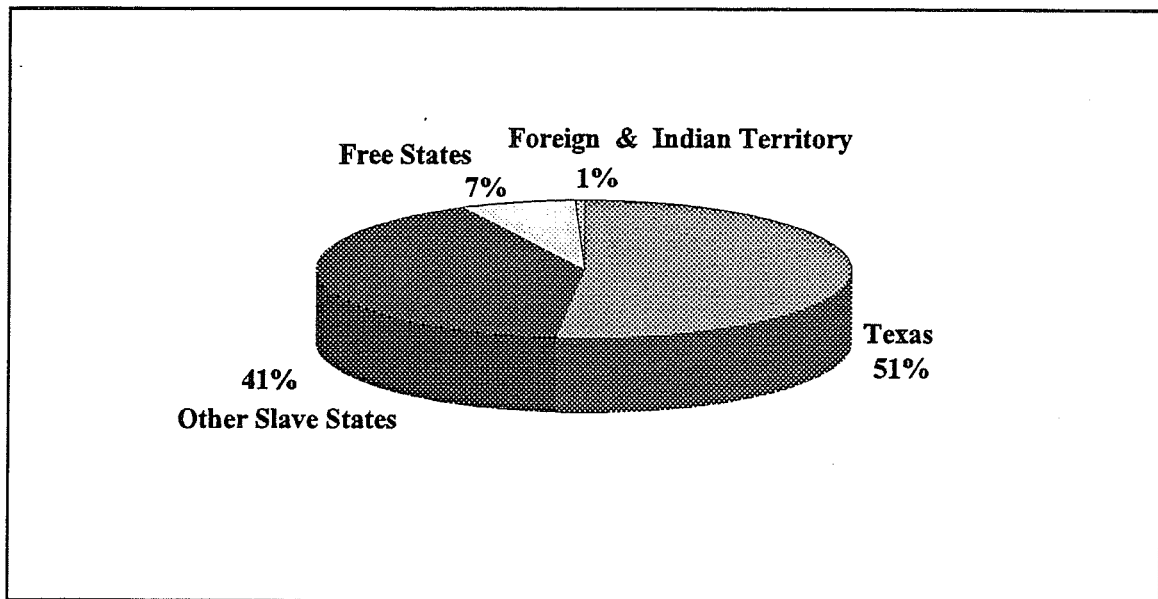


Figure 4. *Origin of African-Americans in the City of San Antonio in 1870 after the Civil War influx. Note the number from Texas and other Confederate states, indicating a probable movement of ex-slaves from the deep south and east Texas.*

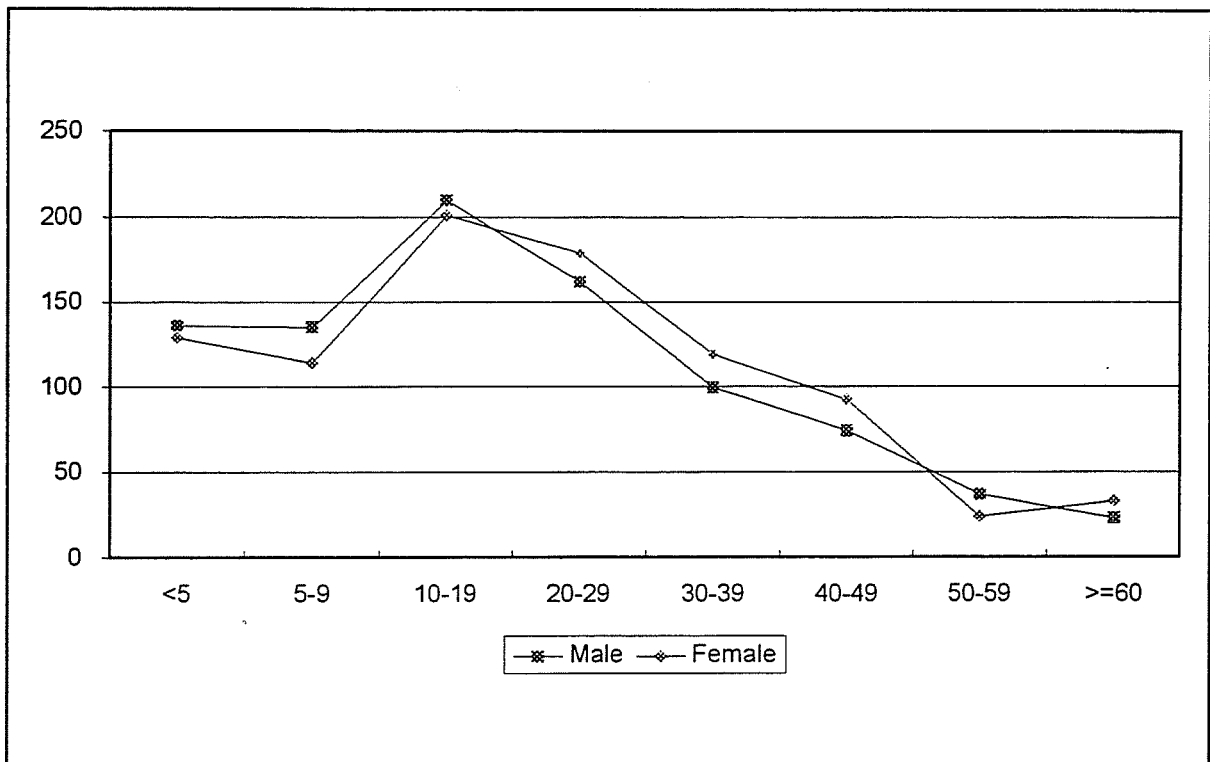


Figure 5. *Relative frequency of African-American males and females by age groups in the 1870 census.* Note that males are more numerous between 0 to 19 years of age but females are more numerous between 20 to 49 years of age. These data suggest an age-related differential mortality between males and females.

Further studies of the 1870 census records (see Appendix 1 for details), such as the place of origin (Figure 4), and age group comparisons (Figure 5), clearly indicate that several important demographic changes occurred in the later half of the nineteenth century. The timing of these population changes seem to correspond to the end of the Civil War. This very limited research indicates a definite need for further demographic studies of this time period in order to understand the effects upon the social structure, settlement patterns, and economics of San Antonio.

AFRICAN-AMERICAN ARCHAEOLOGY IN AMERICA: NEW RESEARCH AVENUES

The contextual diversity of African-American archaeological sites has prevented the development of a singular methodological approach to understanding such sites. A review of the current literature reveals that three broad approaches have been employed by historical archaeologists examining African-American sites and deposits: socioeconomic studies, settlement type/spatial analysis, and subsistence studies. The archaeological research has primarily attempted to identify ethnically distinct behavior through the analysis of material remains. Unfortunately interpretation has been greatly limited by the inability of archaeologists to clearly separate ethnic choices from socioeconomic choices. The problem is

compounded by time and geography: throughout the historic period, in different regions of the U.S., there has been great variability in African-American's economic power, integration into the market economy, ability and willingness to assimilate into European-American society, and adaptation to different (natural and constructed) environments. Each of the methodological approaches, however, does provide a coherent, well-organized strategy for better understanding African-American households or sites at particular times and places.

Late nineteenth- and early twentieth-century African-American archaeological research appears to be in a formative period, even though

few researchers have been able to transcend descriptive or methodological reports. Often these reports include contrasting data that attempt to measure the economic power of African-Americans relative to the European-American population. The recognized differences and similarities, however, are frequently the result of individual factors such as consumer choice and not strictly ethnic determinants.

Socioeconomic Studies

Ceramics are the most frequently used artifacts for determining relative socioeconomic status at African-American sites. Majewski and O'Brien (1987) report that a number of archaeologists have examined ethnicity, occupation, and status through the analysis of ceramic materials (Cheek et al. 1983; Felton and Schulz 1983; Henry 1987; Henry and Garrow 1982; Henry et al. 1983; Klein and Garrow 1982; Saunders 1982; Schuyler 1980; Spencer-Wood 1987). Few of the studies have successfully separated ethnicity from socioeconomic position. Majewski and O'Brien (1987:190) argue that the difficulty associated with separating "race from class" results from the non-independence of the two concepts.

Many of the ceramic studies utilize ceramic price scales created by Miller (1980), Henry (1987), and Henry and Garrow (1982). Researchers using the price indices argue that socioeconomic differences in purchasing patterns and ceramic type consumption can be inferred from the mean value of the ceramic assemblage. Typically less decorated wares have been considered indicative of lower socioeconomic status.

Other research suggests that vessel shape rather than type may be a better material indicator of socioeconomic status for historic sites (Majewski and O'Brien 1987; South 1972). Arguments for ethnic differences in preferred vessel form are predicated on the assumption that food practices have traditionally varied among ethnic groups and that differences in food preparation and

serving items are reflected in the archaeological remains (Baker 1980; Deetz 1977; Otto 1984). Otto (1975, 1977, 1984) and Baker (1978, 1980) both identified distinctions between hollow ware and flatware utilization between different ethno/socioeconomic groups at plantations. Both authors conclude that the ceramic and faunal remains indicate that African-American slaves consumed greater quantities of slow-simmer foods (i.e., stews and soups) prepared and served in hollow ware vessels. Fox (personal communication 1995) believes that vessel form, and its dietary implications, is a better predictor of economic status than ethnicity in late nineteenth and early twentieth century urban contexts.

A few archaeologists have attempted to identify purely ethnic-based differences in ceramics with varying degrees of success. Cheek and Friedlander (1990) note that ca. 1880-1940 alley sites occupied by African-Americans contained proportionately less stoneware than white-occupied street properties in Washington D.C. Saunders (1982) detected similar differences in stoneware assemblages from Texas sites. Cheek and Friedlander (1990), however, declined to offer an explanation for the difference in stoneware quantities and cautioned that their results should not always be expected at other sites.

Consumer choice studies have attempted to explain why goods of differing quality and/or price were selected by individuals and households for acquisition and archaeological deposition. Consumer choice researchers argue that social class and ethnic group membership greatly affect the access to goods and the distribution of goods (Adams 1966; Fried 1967; Hodder and Orton 1979; Rathje 1971; Sabloff and Rathje 1975; Spencer-Wood 1987). Unfortunately, few archaeologists have been able to observe ethnic identity in late nineteenth and early twentieth century deposits (Praetzellis et al. 1988).

An explanatory model for ethnic consumer choice that strongly emphasizes the downward

transmission of cultural and behavioral ideals (trickle-down economics), has been constructed by Praetzellis et al. (1988). The model suggests that by examining consumer behavior archaeologists can measure divergence from middle-class ideals and practices in urban contexts. Praetzellis's argument assumes that the middle class emulated the elite's consumptive behavior and then, eventually, transmitted those ideas to ethnic minorities.

Mullins (1995) argues that the absence of certain European-American artifacts in African-American deposits may reflect a conscious choice by African-Americans to resist assimilation into white society. In his analysis of a 1860-1900 African-American neighborhood in Annapolis, Maryland, Mullins (1995) argues that although African-American and European-American artifact assemblages often appear very similar, the assemblages reflect African-Americans' self-awareness of their cultural distinctiveness. After examining faunal and dietary remains, Mullins concluded that African-Americans, apparently, in resistance to the dominant European-American society, never fully integrated themselves into the local market economy.

Settlement Patterns and Spatial Analysis

Orser (1988:82) defines settlement archaeology as the study of past social relationships expressed in physical terms. Most settlement studies assume that different cultures use space differently (Hall 1963). Deagan (1982) argues that settlement patterns can reveal similarities and differences in the ways in which various groups have adapted to new environments throughout the U.S. during the historic period.

Most analyses of African-American settlement patterns have been performed on plantation sites. L. Lewis (1985) suggests that structures and activities on plantations are related to the economic function-intensive export crop production of such settlements. Singleton (1985) attempted to identify cultural forms and patterns that were directly traced to African origins with

some success. Similarly, other research has focused on the architectural expression of "Africanism" (K. Lewis 1985). Kelso (1984), in his examination of Kingsmill Plantation, argues that settlement patterns on plantations may derive from a variety of non-ethnic and non-economic factors such as defense considerations, ecological decisions (proximity to springs), and intended duration of occupation.

Many archaeologists have examined plantations that have been continuously occupied by African-Americans from the Colonial period until the late-nineteenth century in an attempt to understand how settlement decisions have changed over time (Orser 1985, 1988). Likewise, Orser and Nekola (1985) and K. Lewis (1985) suggest that settlement patterns varied as the functional orientation of the site was redefined over time.

Many studies have examined the intra-site (within a single site) use of space on plantations (Drucker 1981; Garrow 1982; K. Lewis 1985; Moore 1981; Singleton 1980; Trinkley and Caballero 1983; Wheaton and Garrow 1985; Wheaton et al. 1983; Zierden and Calhoun 1983). Much of this research is modeled after South's (1977) artifact pattern analysis which examines the proportional differences in functionally related artifact types across sites. However, Orser (1989) argues that pattern recognition studies do not adequately explain the complexities of plantation life nor do they provide a mechanism for observing change over time.

Archaeological research at urban African-American sites has tended to ignore ethnicity/ethnic adaptation to the urban environment in favor of looking at the more general process of urban development. Staski (1982), however, argues that behavioral and material symbols of ethnicity are most visible in the city.

Likewise, most spatial analyses of African-American urban sites consider the urban determinants over ethnicity for understanding activity areas, land use, and artifact

distributions. Binford (1978), Moir (1987), Portnoy (1981), South (1977), and Yellen (1977), for example, have created predictive models that define activity zones/reuse patterns as developing according to limited land availability in relationship to activities occurring at a location.

Foodways

Numerous researchers have suggested that foodways often served as a mechanism for maintaining ethnic identity. Ascher and Fairbanks (1971), Drucker (1981), Fairbanks (1974), Miller (1979), Otto (1977, 1984), and Reitz (1994) explored the relationship between diet and socioeconomic status and ethnicity on plantation sites, but surprisingly few dietary reconstruction-ethnicity studies have been completed for non-plantation sites. Cheek and Friedlander's (1990) study of 1880-1940 African-American alley households in Washington D.C. indicates that the consumption of pig's feet, opossum, and greens reflected the rural background of the African-American inhabitants. They also detected a distinction between meat preparation for African-American and European-Americans. Cleaver-cut bones were more frequently associated with Anglo-American households while sawed bone was more common in African-American households; in contrast to most researchers Cheek and Friedlander (1990) are unconvinced that the difference reflects an ethnic preference for meat preparation.

Many faunal analyses and dietary reconstructions have ignored ethnicity altogether. Branstner and Martin (1987) report that Baugher (1982), Bellantoni et al. (1982), Davidson (1982), Martin and Demeter (1985), and Shulz and Gust (1983) emphasize class attributes or site function within an urban context rather than ethnicity. Lyman (1987) and Schmitt and Zeier (1993) have examined the cost of different cuts of meat and their consumption by different economic groups, and could determine no significant differences.

Conclusions

A successful archaeological analysis of ethnic groups can utilize a number of quasi-independent dimensions. Previous research efforts indicate that socioeconomic status and consumer choice, spatial analysis, and foodways are all potential avenues for further analysis. Clearly the preservation of archaeological materials is a prerequisite for any additional analysis and the following section addresses the potential for archaeological preservation in the VIA Park and Ride Project area as none of these topics has been explored on nineteenth-century African-American historic sites in San Antonio.

EVALUATION OF PROPERTIES IN THE PROJECT AREA

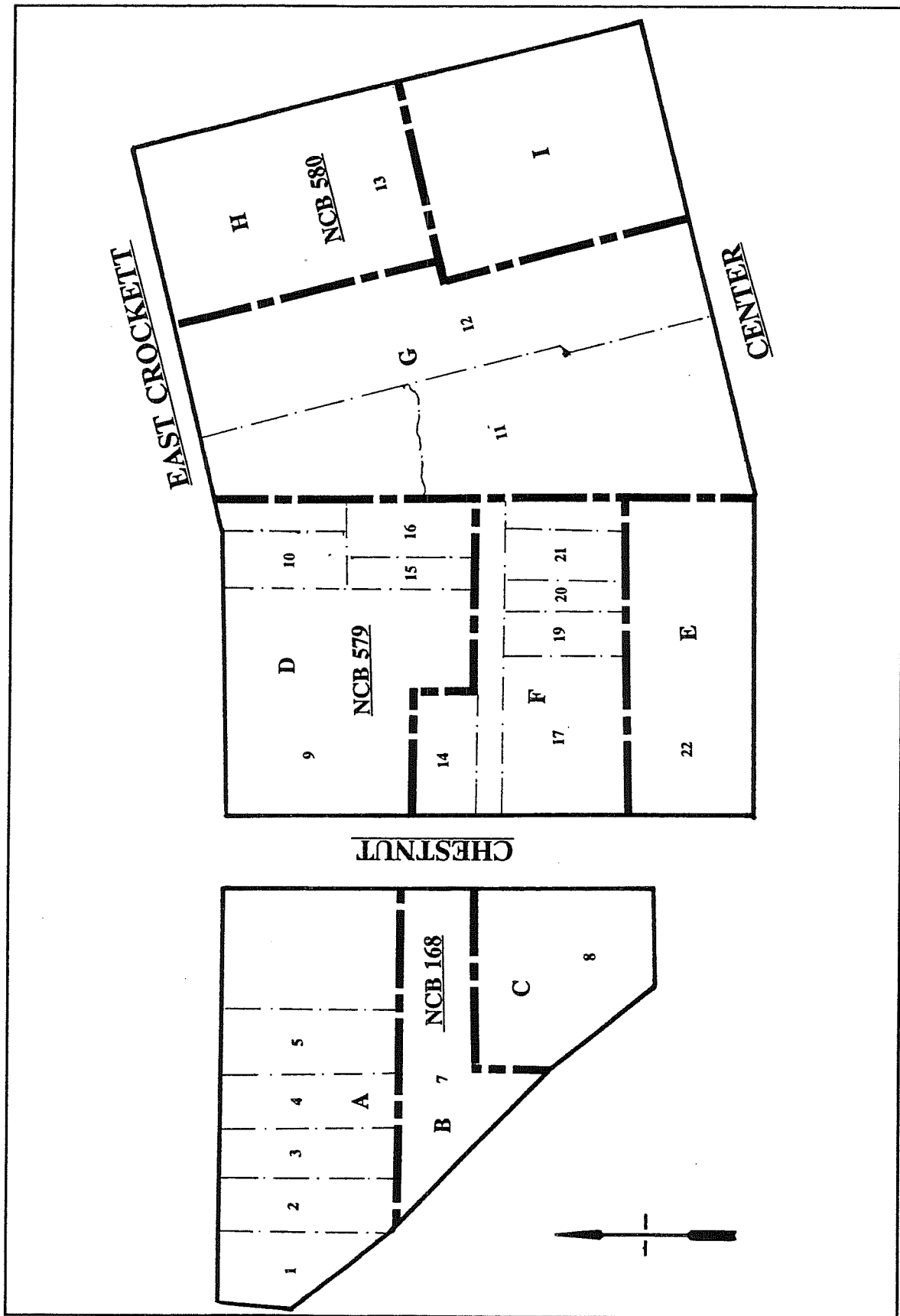


Figure 6. Areas grouped for archaeological evaluation.

An evaluation of the various individual lots within the project area, grouped by similar areas (Figure 6), is provided below. Each structure erected within an area was considered from the aspect of ownership, purpose, dates of construction and demolition, and present state of preservation. Based upon these aspects, the following areas are evaluated for consideration of further investigation. The evidence to support these individual lot histories is contained in Appendix 2, partial abstracts of the NCBs, and Appendix 3, occupant information from various city directories and Sanborn Insurance maps of 1892, 1904, 1912, and 1951.

NCB 168, Area A

Properties facing on East Crockett Street between IH 37 and Chestnut Street are grouped into Area A. Lot 1 (now Lot 12) at 508 East Crockett; a portion of this property remains as the right-of-way for IH 37. The first construction on this lot was in approximately 1868; the last structure was demolished ca. 1975. The frame home at Lot 2 (now Lot 11) at 510 East Crockett is still standing. It was probably constructed in 1906 and was the first structure on the lot. A frame home was constructed in 1892 on Lot 3 (now Lot 10) 512 East Crockett, and demolished in 1973. Lot 4 (now Lot 9) at 518 East Crockett first had an adobe home, constructed in approximately 1860, which remained standing until replaced by a frame structure in 1920. The latter was demolished in 1980. The original structure on Lot 5 (now Lot 8) at 520 East Crockett was probably constructed in 1860, but it was destroyed shortly afterward. It was replaced ca. 1904 by a frame home that was demolished in the early 1970s. The western portion of Lot 6 (now Lot 7) 526 East Crockett may have had a structure constructed in 1868, but it was probably replaced by a frame structure in 1896. The frame structure was demolished in 1980. This corner lot, Lot 7 (now Lot 6) at 530 East Crockett, also likely had a structure constructed as early as 1868, but it was replaced

by a frame structure constructed around 1903 that was demolished in 1980.

This area offers the highest potential of recovering intact occupational remains. Even though the western portion has either been eliminated or greatly altered by freeway construction, the eastern lots retain much of their original character. Lots 4, 5, and 7 all once contained structures dating from the early to late 1860s, thus holding a high potential for the existence of wells, cisterns, and privies. Lot 4 has the highest potential for surviving archaeological information, because available archival sources show the exact location of all structures and the lot seems to have suffered the least disturbance.

NCB 168, Area B

The central portion of NCB 168 was once the entrance of Zipp Alley onto Chestnut Street. The entire area is composed of Lot 7 (now Lot 5). The property was acquired by Emil E. Zipp in 1907. By 1910 it had been developed into small black rental houses. All structures were demolished shortly after 1960.

Even though this area presents an opportunity to explore an interesting aspect of the area development in terms of alley communities, surface conditions are not promising. Much surface disturbance occurred during freeway construction and clearing of other lots within NCB 168. The insubstantial construction of these units—wooden frame construction upon pier and post foundations—leaves ephemeral traces that are easily destroyed by even minor surface disturbances. Furthermore, the late construction period would have been after public water was readily available; therefore wells, cisterns, and privies are not expected. Even trash collection would have been common during this period.

This area suffered the most impact from the freeway construction. Not only was much of the area badly disturbed by construction activities for both the freeway and on-ramp, but it also suffered disturbance while it served as a staging area for material storage during construction of other freeway sections.

NCB 579, Area C

This area includes properties at the corner of East Center and Chestnut streets. The most dominant structure—the Second Baptist Church—and its support structures were on Lot 8 (now Lots 2, 3, and 4). The building was constructed in 1885 and demolished in 1968 for construction of IH 37. Not only was much of the area badly disturbed by construction activities for both the freeway and on-ramp, but it also suffered disturbance while serving as a staging area during construction of other freeway sections.

NCB 579, Area D

Area D includes properties facing on East Crockett Street between Chestnut and Walnut streets. Lots 6, 7, 8, and 9 (now lot 9) are at 226–232 Chestnut and 604 East Crockett. The structure at 226 Chestnut was constructed after 1882 and served as both a rental and restaurant. The structure at 228 Chestnut was constructed ca. 1878 by the Sons and Daughters of Zion, and later became a rental house and barbershop. Between 1910 and 1915 several structures occupied the corner lot at Chestnut and Crockett and were generally commercial business establishments. The corner structure was a saloon from 1903 to 1934. The house at 604 Crockett was constructed around 1880 by James Manuel, his family remained there until the mid-1930s. The building later became a popular barbecue cafe. The remaining houses on Crockett Street were constructed in 1904 and demolished ca. 1950 and replaced shortly thereafter by the building constructed to house W. W. Grainger, Inc., electrical company. The structure was occupied until recently by Christopher Press. The structures at Lots 5a and 7a (now Lot 10) at 614–616 Crockett were also

constructed ca. 1904 and served primarily as rental properties. The structure at 614 Crockett was demolished by mid-1970 and 616 razed in 1983.

Due to the massive foundation constructed for the W. W. Grainger building, traces of the former structure probably have not survived. The area behind the building has been heavily modified by construction of parking lots.

NCB 579, Area E

Area E properties face on East Center Street, east from Chestnut Street. The first structure at Lot 22 at 201 N. Center was constructed ca. 1887 as the residence of Emily Thoroughgood, a washerwoman. This residence was apparently replaced by a commercial frame building sometime after 1897 and served as a restaurant. This structure was razed in 1970. A frame home was constructed at Lot 22 at 203 N. Center in 1885. It served primarily as rental property for a series of African-Americans. It had been converted to a saloon by 1940, and was demolished in 1976. In approximately 1885 a frame structure was constructed on Lot 22 at 205 N. Center for Ellen Miller, who with her family occupied the home until 1937. It later served as rental property and was demolished in 1976. At Lot 22 (207 N. Center) a frame residence was erected in 1879 but was destroyed in 1920 for the construction of the two-story brick building now standing on the site. A residence was constructed on Lot 18 at 209 N. Center in 1883. It served a series of owners and renters until it was razed in 1959. The frame house that previously occupied Lot 18 at 211 N. Center was constructed in 1882 and demolished in 1959. Sometime between 1883 and 1886 a dwelling was constructed on Lot 18 at 213 N. Center; this home was also razed in 1959. A two-story frame home was constructed in 1882 and burned ca. 1912 and was apparently rebuilt on Lot 18 at 215 N. Center. It was razed in 1964. Around 1885 two wooden structures were constructed on Lot 18 at 219 N. Center. The rear structure may have been constructed as late as the turn of the century when it served as a restaurant. These

structures also burned ca. 1912. They were rebuilt, then demolished in 1965.

The frame structures that previously occupied these lots were all constructed in the early to late-1880s and were demolished between 1959 and 1976. Since their demolition the areas on the extreme eastern and western margins have been utilized as parking areas. The central portion is basically unaltered since the removal of the structures so lends itself to further testing; however, again due to the late period of occupation the probability of wells, cisterns, privies, and trash pits is low.

NCB 579, Area F

This area includes the standing structures on Chestnut Street and Ellis Alley. Three standing structures exist on Lot 17 at 210, 212, and 214 Chestnut. The structure at 210 Chestnut is the oldest of the three standing structures, dating to ca. 1895, while the two houses at 212 and 214 were constructed in 1910 to replace an earlier residence. An additional structure was also constructed at that time to the rear of 210 and remains standing. A standing structure on Lot 17 at 217 Ellis Alley, previously designated 141 Ellis Alley, was constructed in approximately 1910. This house seems to have replaced an earlier structure constructed ca. 1887. The standing structure on Lot 19 at 225 Ellis Alley appears to be the oldest remaining building in the study area, dating to approximately 1885. There have been extensive additions to the original structure over the years. Twelve additional structures were built facing Ellis Alley on Lots 20 and 21. Nine of these were constructed as early as 190, six remained standing in 1971; but by 1979 only four remained and these have since been razed. The Beacon Light Hall on Lot 14 at 220 Chestnut, the lot upon which the Beacon Light Lodge Hall now stands, was previously occupied by a frame domicile constructed in 1883. This frame structure remained standing until 1917. The rear of the lot was the original site of the lodge hall, built in 1912. The present structure was built after the lodge acquired the full property in 1931. It has served as lodge hall,

mortuary, tailor shop, and barber shop prior to its present use as office space.

The lots comprising this area have greatly varying archaeological potentials. Since some of these structures will be relocated and some demolished, testing on various lots could prove productive. The remains of the original Beacon Lodge building may still exist behind the present structure; however, the nature of its construction is not clear. Although it was 22 feet high to the eaves, it may have been constructed on a post-and-beam foundation which would leave little trace in the ground.

NCB 580, Area G

This area includes properties facing on East Crockett Street to the corner of Walnut Street. This lot, Lot 11 at 622 E. Crockett, once contained a two-story frame Victorian home. It was built ca. 1892 and belonged to the prominent physician Green J. Starnes. The family resided at this address until 1915. After that date the structure was occupied by renters until its destruction in 1959. The lot stands vacant today. At 626 and 628 E. Crockett (Lots 3 and 4) two small frame homes were constructed near the turn of the twentieth century and served as rentals for several families. Two additional buildings were constructed behind 628, in approximately 1904, and also served as rentals. All were demolished by 1970.

The Green J. Starnes lot should be tested given its ownership history and the nature of its construction; however the lot may have experienced severe clearing and leveling that could have badly disturbed any remaining evidence. Limited testing should be aimed at determining the condition of surviving archaeological remains.

NCB 580, Area H

This area includes properties facing onto Walnut Street south of East Crockett. In 1903 this portion of Walnut facing on the railroad right-of-way contained 10 frame houses. Six had

African-American owners and the remainder were rental houses for African-Americans. The homes on the southern portion—201, 203, 207, and 213 Walnut—were razed for construction of the standing structure at the corner of Walnut and North Center streets, originally the Collins-Gunther Building. The remaining houses were demolished prior to 1924. Due to extensive construction and paving for parking facilities, surviving traces of these rather insubstantial structures are unlikely.

NCB 580, Area I

This area includes properties at the corner of Walnut and East Center streets. The two frame homes at 237 North Center and 239 North Center were demolished between 1915 and 1919 for the construction of the brick building of the American Railway Express Company. In the 1950s this became the San Antonio Machine and Supply Company, and in 1970 the Express-News garage. To the west stands the San Antonio Plumber and Pipe Fitters Union building, constructed in the 1950s.

There are no plans at present to alter these structures and the area to the west appears never to have contained structures; therefore, no work is recommended for this area.

Evaluation Summary

Area A holds the highest potential for further archaeological investigations based upon several factors. It was the first area developed and therefore contains the prospect of containing the remains of a complete sequence of occupation and social change. All the eastern lots along East Crockett Street were transferred to African-American owners between 1860 and 1868; four early homesteads were erected upon original numbered Lots 4, 5, and 6. These structures would have been the earliest structures within the project area and, as such, could produce the maximum data for excavation. Lot 4, 518 Crockett, presents the most promising site because the exact location of that structure was depicted on the 1904 Sanborn Insurance map,

the other three structures were destroyed prior to that date and their locations on the lots are unknown. In addition, the structure that replaced the 1860s home was of frame construction and probably did not destroy the original foundation. The later structure was not demolished until ca. 1980 and the lot has not been altered since. An investigation of this lot could reveal invaluable information of the nature of early settlement patterns of the freed slave population at the end of the Civil War and their transition into the community.

The remainder of NCB 168 has suffered some apparent impacts. Area B, Zipp Alley, offers a potential to investigate an African-American alley community, but integrity must be established. Area C supported a local church that was important to the neighborhood; but, again, archaeological integrity must be established by further investigations.

Twentieth-century construction has severely impacted the archaeological integrity of any historically significant materials in Area D. Most of Area E has also suffered from extensive twentieth-century construction, but the eastern portion may have surviving materials.

The area along Ellis Alley in Area F contains a variety of structures with construction and occupation dates ranging from the mid-1880s to the present. The structures are both commercial and residential and indicate a wide range of economic status. Additional investigations within the yards of the standing structures and on the original site of the Beacon Lodge Hall could yield a clearer evaluation of their potential.

The structure in Area G that stood at 622 East Crockett, the Green J. Starnes home, presents several aspects that make it especially promising in respect to the data it might provide. Dr. Starnes was without question the most prosperous of the residents within the project area; therefore any trash deposits would serve as an important economic indicator for the area. The construction date, ca. 1892, places it within the range of dates that might be expected to yield

significant trash deposits; however, we do not know how alterations to the lot during the past two decades may have disturbed the original living surfaces. Areas H and I offer little, if any, archaeological potential due to twentieth-century construction activities.

CONCLUSIONS

The VIA Downtown Park and Ride Facility is on the edge of downtown San Antonio, however it is not clear if intact archaeological materials remain. Much of the project area is disturbed and/or still supports large commercial buildings or parking lots that almost certainly would have a significant impact on the archaeological materials and deposits on those lots.

Area A (the western portion East Crockett Street) has the greatest potential for providing useful information. It was one of the oldest areas to be settled and developed; it was first inhabited by African-Americans and more or less continued to be inhabited by African-Americans; and it has experienced less destructive activities in later years that has almost certainly eradicated the archaeological materials in other portions of the project area.

Area B (Zipp Alley) was not settled as early as Area A, but archaeological materials may have survived intact. Area C (southern Chestnut Street) still contains front porch stairs from one dwelling and might contain preserved foundations from a church.

Area D (central East Crockett and northern Chestnut streets) lacks any indication of relevant and well-preserved archaeological materials. Area E (central Center Street) may have surviving archaeological materials in its eastern portion. This is currently an open lot and parking lot.

Area F (Ellis Alley and central Chestnut Street) may have intact deposits. The oldest standing structure is on Ellis Alley and the second oldest standing structure is in this portion of Chestnut Street. It is possible that intact deposits exist at both properties. Area G (center of East Crockett and center of Central streets) is complex, however, the Starnes lot may contain intact features and deposits. Areas H and I have little archaeological potential.

This is a portion of San Antonio traditionally inhabited by African-Americans for most of its urban-developmental history, and it represents a potentially unique area in terms of archaeological knowledge. At present the potential is poorly defined because of the obvious, numerous, and sever impacts. A limited testing program could assess the scope and scale of these impacts and determine if intensive archaeological excavations are needed.
