

# WHERE SAN ANTONIO VOTERS STAND AHEAD OF ELECTION 2024: RESULTS FROM SAN ANTONIO LIKELY VOTER POLL—OCTOBER 15-20, 2024

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#### **Summary**

**SAN ANTONIO, TX** – A poll of San Antonio likely voters (n=656, MOE= +/- 3.8%) conducted by the UTSA Center for Public Opinion Research (CPOR) shows that Kamala Harris continues to lead Donald Trump among local voters, although by a smaller margin than she did in CPOR's September poll. Collin Allred, however, is in a slightly improved position in his bid to unseat incumbent senator Ted Cruz (Part 1).

Slightly more San Antonio voters report being familiar with the proposed amendments to the San Antonio City Charter that will appear on the ballot this November, although a super-majority (more than 7 in 10) report being unfamiliar with the propositions on the eve of Early Voting beginning in Texas. Unlike CPOR's September poll, the October poll used the verbatim language that appears on the ballot, rather than short descriptions of the propositions. For several propositions (A, D, and F), the support each amendment garnered when the actual ballot language was used did not change much from the September poll. For three other propositions (B, C, and E), there was a substantial difference is support when the actual ballot language was used instead of descriptions. Few voters reported any contact from an organized campaign urging them to support the amendments, suggesting question wording accounts for the differences (Part 2).

The poll also asked San Antonio voters about their plans to vote in the 2025 San Antonio municipal elections. Excluding voters who said they were unlikely to vote in these elections, there was no clear front-runner in the open-seat mayoral race, with more than 70 percent of voters saying they were unfamiliar with the candidates or did not know how they would vote (Part 3).



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#### Part 1. Vote Choice in November General Elections


Kamala Harris led Donald Trump among San Antonio Likely Voters who planned to vote in November (n=656). However, a comparison with CPOR's September poll (n=606) suggests Harris's momentum with local voters has stalled: her support among San Antonio voters dipped from 53.5% in September to 48.8% in October. Donald Trump's standing slightly improved (from 34.0% to 35.6%), while a slightly higher percentage reported they did not know who they would vote for (12.9% to 10.7%).


In the U.S. Senate race, Democratic challenger Colin Allred continues to lead incumbent Senator Ted Cruz among San Antonio voters. Allred now holds a lead over Cruz with 47.8% to Cruz's 30.3%. In September, Allred led 44.3% to 28% among San Antonio voters. About 1 in 5 Bexar voters (18%) remain undecided.

San Antonio voters were also asked about how they planned to vote in U.S. House races in November. Voters preferred Democrats over Republicans by 9.7 points, 45.7% to 36.0%--a narrower gap than the 15.8-point advantage Democrats held over Republicans among San Antonio voters in September.






#### **Part 2. City Charter Amendments**

San Antonio voters were also asked about their familiarity with proposed amendments to the city charter, which were approved by the San Antonio City Council and will appear on the ballot in the upcoming November election.

As was the case in CPOR's June and September polls, a super-majority of voters (71.5%) said they were unaware of the potential amendments in the October poll, conducted on the eve of Early Voting beginning in Texas. However, the share of voters who said they had heard about the proposed changes did increase to 28.5% in October, compared to 19.4% in September.






The poll also asked San Antonio voters if they planned to vote in favor or against each amendment. Unlike CPOR's September poll, the October poll used the verbatim language that appears on the ballot, rather than short descriptions of the propositions. For several propositions, the support for each amendment garnered when the actual ballot language was used did not change much from the September poll when descriptions of the effects of the amendments were used.

As was the case in CPOR's September poll, Proposition A, which would, among other things add a definition of "conflicts of interest" to the charter and require sufficient funding to the Ethics Review Board, attracted the most support, with 56%. Less than 10% were opposed, and 34% were unsure.

Nearly half of respondents (49.8%) said they planned to vote for Proposition D, which would "allow City employees to participate in local political activity consistent with State and Federal law while protecting employees against political retribution and maintaining a general prohibition on participation in local political activity for the city leadership team." Slightly more than 23% were opposed and about 27% percent were unsure. Proposition D garnered slightly more support than it did in September, when voters were provided with a description, when about 45% were supportive and 36% were opposed.

San Antonio voters were slightly less supportive of Proposition F, which would extend the terms of office for the mayor and members of the City Council from two years to four years. A plurality (45.9%) said they would vote in favor of it, with 32% opposed, and 22% unsure. Again, this was similar to the September poll when 42.7% were supportive of the amendment.






For the three other propositions, there was a substantial difference is support when the actual ballot language was used instead of descriptions.

Proposition E, which would amend the city charter to "set and limit the compensation for City Council members and the Mayor at \$70,200 and \$87,800," with annual adjustments tied to area median income, attracted majority support in the October poll. Among voters, 51.6% said they would vote in favor, and only 19.8% said they would vote against (about 29% said they were not sure how they would vote). This is a significant difference from CPOR's September poll, when a majority (50.7%) said they would not support an amendment that would "raise the salaries" of the City Council and Mayor.

As with Proposition E, support for Proposition C looks much different when the actual ballot language is used. CPOR's September poll asked voters if they would support an amendment that would remove the cap on the salary of the city manager, as well as the number of years a person could serve in that position; only about 17% of voters said they supported such a change. When Prop C's actual is used ("Shall the Charter of the City of San Antonio be amended to grant to City Council the authority to set the full terms of the City Manager's employment including tenure and compensation?"), there is significantly more support: 42.6% said they would vote in favor of the proposition, with 27% opposed, and 30.4 percent unsure.




The amendment that would appear to have the least amount of support is Proposition B, with only 37% saying they would vote in favor. However, only 8% are opposed, with nearly 55% unsure. The likely reason for that is the proposition's actual wording, would amend the charter to "revise or eliminate provisions which have been superseded by state law and to update archaic language to current usage," before listing out dozens of sections that would be revised. The length of the proposition likely led many survey respondents to select "I'm not sure"; there does not appear to be real opposition to the proposition. Indeed, in CPOR's September poll, which stated the intent of the proposition was to "revise the language of the charter to account for outdated terms and superseded provisions," it received more support than any other amendment (about 63%).

It is possible that the substantial differences in support for the amendments—particularly Propositions E and C—might stem from organized campaign efforts to get the amendments passed, not just question wording. To investigate this, the minority of voters who reported they were aware of the amendments (n=205) were also asked (prior to amendment support questions), "Thinking about the proposed amendments to the San Antonio City Charter, have you received a printed mailer, phone call, home visit, or any other contact from a campaign or individual urging you to support the charter amendments?" Less than 11% of this minority reported having been contacted and urged to support the charter amendments. I.e., differences in support for Propositions C and E are unlikely between September and October are unlikely to be the result of campaign efforts.





## Part 3. 2025 San Antonio Mayor's Race


San Antonio voters were asked about their likelihood of voting in the May 2025 San Antonio municipal elections. Those who indicated they were at least somewhat likely to vote in May were asked about their choice for mayor among the candidates who have declared their candidacy so far.

As was the case in CPOR's September poll, few San Antonio voters have a clear choice for mayor, suggesting the race is wide open, with 39.6% stating they were not familiar with any of the candidates. Another 31.2% said they were undecided, while 1.94% indicated they would vote for a candidate other than one of the declared options.

Among the declared mayoral candidates, John Courage garnered the most support at 5.7%, down from the 9.2% he received in the September poll. Manny Pelaez trailed closely with 4.8%, while Adriana Rocha Garcia, Beto Altamirano, and Melissa Cabello Havrda each polled above 3%.

#### Part 4. Methodology

#### Sample and Sampling Frame

The sample consisted of likely voters residing in the City of San Antonio, TX. The sampling frame consisted of all registered voters in San Antonio, TX with verified email addresses. Information on registered voters, voter history, and their verified contact information came from a list purchased from the data broker, L2. The survey was fielded from October 15<sup>th</sup> to October 20<sup>th</sup>, 2024.

# Sampling Methodology, Recruitment, and Weighting

Summary answer: voters were randomly selected from three strata in proportion to how much of the electorate each stratum was expected to make up in the November 2024 election. This expectation was based on analysis of previous presidential elections in San Antonio.

Detailed answer: Stratified registration-based sampling (RBS) was used to select the sample. Registered voters with verified email addresses were stratified into three categories, based on personal vote history in presidential general elections: voters, abstainers, and new registrants with no vote history. Estimates of the rates at which each of the three strata were expected to vote in the November 2024 general election were then produced based on an analysis of previous presidential general elections: the rates at which 2016 voters, abstainers, and new registrants voted in the 2020 elections were calculated, as were the rates for these groups in 2012 for the 2016 election. The average of the 2016 and 2020 rates, via turnout records included in the commercial voter file, was used as the benchmark voting rates for 2024. The number of registered voters in each stratum were then multiplied by the estimated voting rates to produce the fraction of the sample each stratum should make up. After the survey was fielded, data were weighted by these strata fractions.

#### **Mode and Language**

Respondents were recruited via email, which provided a link to the survey, hosted on the computer-assisted self-interviewing platform, Qualtrics. Reminder emails were sent out to subjects who had not completed the survey several days after the initial recruitment email was sent out. The survey was bilingual. Respondents were given the option to complete the survey in either English or Spanish.

#### Sample Size, Sampling Error, and Response Rates

73,879 voters were randomly selected in total for participation in the poll. 948 individuals began the survey, with 672 respondents completing the survey. 16 respondents were dropped from the analyses because they reported they were unlikely to vote in the general election. The response rate was approximately 1%, and the completion rate was 71%. The (unadjusted) margin of error for the poll was +/-3.8%.

#### **Data Processing and Quality**

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Bots, fraudulent responses, and multiple submissions were prevented via tools included on the survey platform Qualtrics. Human coders were used to assess open-ended responses. Surveys completed in less than two minutes were to be flagged for straightlining, but no surveys in this poll violated the two-minute rule.

### **Acknowledgement of Limitations**

As with all research, this poll has limitations, and we acknowledge the unmeasured error associated with all forms of public opinion research.
